■ COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The department's focus lies within several core objectives which include economic development, community engagement, neighborhood revitalization, and strategic land planning. Copley strives to foster sound economic development objectives which facilitate investment, through the Community Improvement Corporation, a strategic Business Expansion Retention Plan, and well-placed Infrastructure. We emphatically believe engaging with our residents will foster greater community pride and collective unity. Part of that engagement includes engaging with homeowners to improve and enhance the housing stock and thereby help foster strong and prosperous neighborhoods. Residents are encouraged to utilize the Property Maintenance Code and Keep Copley Beautiful initiatives to help protect and restore our neighborhoods. BUSINESS RECRUITMENT AND EXPANSION (BRE)

As part of an ongoing effort to assist in keeping Copley businesses competitive, the Community & Economic Development Department administers a Business Retention and Expansion (BRE) Plan. The BRE is the foundation of effective economic development and often includes onsite business visitations. The Department's BRE focuses on finding

ways to help businesses overcome regulatory obstacles or working to find solutions to assist with site relocation or business expansion.

We also focus on recruiting and showcasing what a great place Copley is to invest in. We encourage prospective businesses to reach out to understand what land and commercial space is for sale or vacant throughout the Township. Connecting new businesses with the right people within the community can spring success and promotion, which we also take great pride in with our ribbon-cutting ceremonies offered to every new business (photo).

Whether you are an existing business or looking to locate in Copley, we pride ourselves on keeping strong relationships with our state and local partners who assist with permitting, grants, and incentives. With so many different agencies and opportunities available to businesses - the information can be overwhelming, and that's where we are happy to help sift through what fits best for you and your specific situation. ZONING PERMITS

Looking to break ground? Residential and commercial improvements are handled by our Zoning Inspector and more information can be found on the "Start and Project" page of our website. There you will find step-by-step instructions on regulations, what you need to submit, and how to get approved! For residential - whether you are installing a pool, building a home, or adding a deck, the process is easy and can be done all online. Commercial projects are subject to more review depending upon the degree of work, the "Start a Project"

page outlines minor, modified, and major site plan requirements that commercial projects are categorized by. Questions related to Zoning Permits, should be directed to our Zoning Inspector, Shawna Gfroerer.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

The purpose of the Property Maintenance Code is to protect the public health, safety, public convenience, comfort, prosperity, or general welfare as it pertains to areas, premises, and buildings used for residential, commercial, industrial, travel, and public purposes. Residents are able to report property maintenance complaints online through our website.

Copley is committed to providing a safe environment for all residents. The Department of Community & Economic Development is charged with identifying and removing blighted structures for the goal of creating safe environments in all areas of the Township. Revitalization efforts are geared towards the repurposing of blighted land to assist with stormwater management, recreation, and much more!

The Property Maintenance Code itself can be found on our website, and any questions related to the code itself or to file a complaint can be directed through our Code Enforcement Officer, Jeff Newman.



NEIGHBORHOOD AMBASSADORS

The Neighborhood Master Plan, developed through our Comprehensive Land Use Plan is designed to identify and explore the many unique and charming neighborhoods within Copley. While neighborhoods consist of different home styles and development patterns, each neighborhood inherently has passionate individuals with intimate knowledge of strengths, weaknesses, and opportunities for their area. The Community & Economic Development Department is committed to being the conduit and assisting the local residents to bring about the change they wish to see. Residents are encouraged to volunteer as Ambassadors in each neighborhood. To become an ambassador, please contact our Director, Loudan Klein.



BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

Residential and commercial construction, as well as strategic land use decisions are guided by three boards and commission here in Copley. The Architectural Review Board is charged with design review of all new construction, changes, and additions to commercial, industrial and multi-family projects including signage. The Board is authorized and directed to provide an advisory review to the Zoning Inspector. The Board of Zoning Appeals or BZA consists of five residents appointed by the Copley Township Board of Trustees tasked with holding public hearings related to: change or extension of a non-conforming use, conditional uses, variances, and administrative appeals. The Zoning Commission, also a five resident appointed commission by the Copley Township Board of Trustees was established for the purpose of developing and maintaining a plan regulating land use within the Township. This plan, set forth both in texts and maps, indicates permitted and prohibited uses of all land within the Township. Actions of the Zoning Commission are subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees. All Township Boards and Commissions have staggered terms, and quite often vacancies are available. Mr. Klein oversees and coordinates all residential, commercial, and industrial development activities within the Township which facilitates tax base growth, provides new job opportunities, and maintains the community's reputation as being a great place to live, work and do business.

Shawna Gfroerer, MPA , Zoning Inspector. Ms. Gfroerer serves as the Zoning Inspector supporting the overall operations of the zoning & permitting process for the Township. As part of her responsibilities, Ms. Gfroerer is the Department liaison for the Architectural Review Board, Board of Zoning Appeals and the Zoning Commission.

Jeff Newman, Code Enforcement Officer. Mr. Jeff Newman serves as the Township's Code Enforcement Officer (CEO) and is responsible for the implementation and enforcement of the Property Maintenance Code. Mr. Newman reviews concerns and complaints by performing on-site investigations. Mr. Newman is tasked with ensuring structures are structurally safe and properties are free from nuisance and blight affects.

Clarissa Hunt, Administrative Assistant. As the Administrative Assistant for the Department of Community & Economic Development, Ms. Hunt assists the Director, the Zoning Inspector and the Code Enforcement Officer as well as serves as a liaison for the various events, activities, programs and business celebration

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT CORPORATION (CIC)

The Community Improvement Corporation (CIC) is designed to advance, encourage, and promote the industrial, economic, commercial, and civic development of Copley Township. The CIC functions as a not-for-profit and has all the powers granted a corporation not-for-profit under Chapter 1702 and 1724 of the Ohio Revised Code. The Copley Township Board of Trustees have officially designated the CIC as the Township's agency for economic development per Chapter 1724 of the Ohio Revised Code. Guided by a 10-person Board of Directors, the CIC is focused on revitalizing undeveloped or underutilized land throughout the community and supporting local businesses through its Annual Matching Grant Program. From directing your calls to greeting Township visitors, Beth is your first link to an entire network of Administrative Staff here to serve you!

Beth works closely with our Social Media Content Manager, Sue Mack, in getting the word out about all the happenings in Copley Township. Sue's gift with technology provides a digital link to Township services as well as providing links to County and State agencies. You can sign-up on the website to receive notifications of meetings scheduled with the Board of Trustees and Zoning Boards, view past meetings, and find answers to some of the most frequently asked questions. The Township has a presence on Face Book, Twitter, Instagram and Linked-In where current events and activities are highlighted. Residents can receive emergency notifications through NIXLE - a reverse information system that provides news on weather alerts, road closures and other crisis situations.

Rounding out the Administrative Team is our Human Resource Manager, Selma Muller. In addition to taking care of our 100+ employees with their wage and benefit needs, Selma is also responsible for the Township's document management system, our employee wellness program and for procuring office supplies. As we all know, the success of any organization is directly related to the efficiency of those who take care of the administrative tasks – to that end, Selma is critical to the Township's ability to provide the unparalleled services our residents and business owners have come to appreciate.

SERVICE

The Service Department is tasked with maintaining all Township-owned buildings and their properties along with all dedicated Township road right-of-ways. With a crew of nine full-time professionals possessing a variety of skills, the Service Department cares for our 80-acre Community Park, Copley Circle and three cemeteries while maintaining all Township buildings - Copley Town Hall, Fire Station #1, Old Fire Station #2, Service Department garages, the Police Station, the Community Park maintenance building, equipment storage facilities, the salt storage building, the Historical Depot, and ACY Caboose. In addition, the Township preserves 61.715 miles of Township roads ensuring safe and secure passage in any and all types of weather conditions.

The Service Department is also responsible for maintaining the Copley Township Recycle Center located at 1280 Sunset Drive, next to the Copley Police Department. The Copley Township Recycle Center was made possible by using Community Recycling Access Grant (CRAG) funding from Summit Reworks, the solid waste management authority for Summit County. The facility opened in August 2012 and was built to give residents a way to recycle if they have no other means to do so and one doesn't have to be a Copley resident to use it.

The Recycle Center, is open on Thursdays from 3PM to 7PM and Friday and Saturday from 9AM to 1PM. Our



Recycle Center Monitors, Paul "Andy" Schlegel and Dennis Jebber, are at the center to inspect all recyclables in order to prevent trash contamination.

There are three recycle containers; Commingle Container, Aluminum Cans Container and the Paper/Cardboard Container. Due to changes in the recycling industry worldwide, our accepted item list has changed. To view the entire list of accepted items, please visit our website at: www.copley.oh.us or call the Copley Service Department at 330-666-0365. There are guidance signs and flyers available on site to help users deposit their recycling items into the correct containers. Please take a flyer home for future reference.

FIRE

The Copley Fire Department will work together to provide superior service to Copley Township citizens and businesses through comprehensive risk management and safe, efficient, and effective response. Copley Fire Department Mission Statement

Established as a volunteer fire department in 1937, the Copley Fire Department is a well-equipped, professionally staffed operation. The department is made up of full and part-time personnel working around the clock to provide Fire, Rescue, EMS, and Prevention services to Copley Township and surrounding communities.

Copley Fire Department staffs and operates two fire stations 24/7. Station Number 1 serves as the headquarters for the department. Located at Copley Town Hall, 1540 S. Cleveland-Massillon Road, the operations section resides in the lower level of the Town Hall. Fire Administration offices are located on the main floor. Station Number 2 is located at 4570 Medina Road, on Stony Hill, just west of the Montrose commercial area. This station is jointly operated by both Copley and Bath Township Fire Departments. This relationship started over 25 years ago and has saved millions of dollars for both townships while providing a second fire station location for both communities.

As an EMS pioneer, the Copley Fire Department established EMS in Copley beginning in 1974, with the first Paramedics graduating in 1976. From its humble beginning using a 1968 Chevy van, the department now provides modern, high-tech rescue and emergency medical services. Under the medical direction of Doctor Andrew Yocum, the Copley Township Fire Department employs highly trained Paramedics who use an aggressive medical protocol and state-of-the-art equipment to provide Advanced Life Support (ALS) to Copley residents.

Consistent with the mission, Copley Fire Department trains and prepares for response to all hazards, including Fire, Rescue, and EMS. Utilizing an apparatus fleet of 3 Fire Engines, 3 ALS Ambulances, 1 Ladder Truck, 1 Water Tanker, and 1 Brush Truck, Copley Fire Department responds to approximately 3,000 calls for service annually. In addition to maintaining a constant readiness to respond, Copley Fire Department incorporates robust Risk Management activities deployed under the Prevention program.

An integral part of any public safety program is Prevention. This simple yet powerful approach involves the whole community as stakeholders. Together, the Fire Department, business owners, and residents of Copley collaborate through programs including Fire Safety Inspections, Child Car Seat Installations, Residential Knox Box Program, and Fire Safety Training. Copley Fire Department also empowers the public by providing Fire Extinguisher Training, First Aid, and CPR Classes. This synergistic relationship makes Copley Township a safe and enjoyable place to work and live.


POLICE

Copley Township is the ninth largest community in Summit County by population. There are 18,403 residents and 6,900 housing units. The Police Department has 30 Officers and one Police K-9 Officer that patrol the community. You can reach us by dialing 9-1-1 if you have an emergency, 330-666-8866 for all non-emergency police calls and 330-666-4218 if you wish to reach the business office.

The Copley Police Department offers a variety of programs and policing initiatives to the community.

- DARE - includes lessons to students on drug use and misuse, personal safety and decision making
- Safety Town - which brings instruction to kindergarten aged children, concentrating on traffic safety, calling 9-1-1 and skills to avoid stranger danger
- Vacation house checks - you can have peace of mind that we are making sure your home is safe and secure while you are out of town
- Senior Citizen Watch Program is a way for us to check on seniors daily if needed
- School Resource Officers are in the Copley schools to enhance school safety

Our annual community events include the Annual Bike Rodeo and Halloween in the Park, which are two events



for the children to interact with our Police Officers in a positive way while having fun. There is also Share a Christmas and Christmas with a Cop, these two events help our officers provide a Christmas to families in need. Coffee with a Cop is a monthly program held at Chick-fil-A in Montrose where citizens can meet Copley Officers and ask questions or just enjoy conversation.

The department's Police K-9 Officer is named Chip! Chip is trained in narcotics detection, criminal apprehension, tracking, obedience, article search and is always ready to protect his partner from attacks. He is a valuable member of the Copley Police Department and is on duty to help protect you, your family and our community businesses.

Copley Police Officers also participate in several regional law enforcement efforts. We participate in Metro Swat, Summit County Drug Unit, Onset Task Force, Marshal's Violent Fugitive Task Force and the multi-jurisdictional Mobile Field Force Unit.

FROM THE COVER...

In 2019, the Community and Economic Development Department collaborated with volunteer architects, Marty Caruso and Kelly McPherson, to design a prototype for future gateway signs for the Township. The result?? This one-of-a-kind welcome to Copley Township constructed at the western border of the Township at the intersection of Route 18 and Medina Line Road. This new sign was constructed and landscaped through a collaborative effort between the Township, the Copley Community Improvement Corporation and the Copley Chamber of Commerce.

Next in line, the Town Hall sign was replaced with a similarly constructed sign and landscaping...this time adding lights. Most recently, the eastern border has been enhanced and identified with the Township's third gateway sign welcoming all to Copley Township as they travel from the City of Akron. All together, the plan calls for 10 gateway signs throughout the Township to help visitors - and even our own business owners and residents - to identify when they are within the limits of Copley Township.

History of Ohio Townships

The Pilgrim fathers brought the township form of government to America in 1620. This unit of local government eventually spread as far west as the Rocky Mountains. Today, it is found in 22 states, known as the town or township.

In Ohio, the township predates our state government. The townships' size and shape were determined by the Congressional Acts, which established the various land grants. As the Ohio territory became populated, it was only natural that the surveyed townships should become the basic unit of local government.

In 1804, the elected officials of a township consisted of three trustees, a clerk, two overseers of the poor and a sufficient number of highway supervisors, in addition to justices of the peace and constables. A township treasurer and assessor were later added. In the early years of statehood, Ohio township government cared for the poor, maintained the roads and preserved the peace.

Today, just as in 1804, the township is a political subdivision of the state. To keep pace with the demands of changing times, the functions, duties and obligations of the township have changed over the years. Demands for increased or different services have prompted the state legislature to grant Ohio's 1,308 townships the authority to fulfill these changing needs.

Three trustees and a fiscal officer, each elected to a four-year term, administer our townships today. In addition, some townships now appoint a township administrator, whose duties are defined by the individual township. The township administrator typically helps plan, coordinate and implement township goals.

Elected officials fill their roles on a part-time basis; however, their intimate knowledge of their community, its needs and its citizens enables them to offer more personal service than any other unit of government.

Townships today are responsible for fire and police protection, parks and recreation, zoning, cemeteries, waste disposal, maintaining roads and more.







Copley Outreach Center

The Copley Community Outreach Center is one of the only local community resource centers located in Copley Township. The Center is a faith based, volunteer driven food assistance center that has been in operation since 1995 under the support of the Copley United Methodist Church and Guardian Angels Catholic Church. In 1995, the two Churches converted a small single family dwelling located on the corner of S. Cleveland-Massillon Road and N. Sunnyfield Drive into an Emergency Food Pantry to meet the growing needs of residents in the Township and within the Copley-Fairlawn School District. Over the last twenty-six years, the Center has grown to provide resources for Utility to help prevent shut-offs, as well as emergency food assistance. These services are offered primarily to seniors and low income families. The Outreach Center has partnered with the Akron-Canton Food Bank to assist in food supply needs at a reduced rate.

In December of 2019, Mrs. Maryann Henry was appointed as the new Director of the Copley Outreach Center. Mrs. Henry has taken steps to continue to support all of the families in our community and our school district. The Center is now able to provide annual assistance to over 30 seniors in the community, 100 families and 165 students in the Copley-Fairlawn School District.

The Copley Community Outreach Center is fortunate to have the support of organizations including; The Copley United Methodist Church, Guardian Angels Church, The Copley Fairlawn School District, Copley Kiwanis, and Angels in Blue Jeans, supported by Guardian Angels.

Gold Star Girl Scouts

If you were to line up every box of cookies sold by the Copley-Fairlawn Girl Scouts in 2021, the stretch of Thin Mints, Samoas, and Tagalongs would span over two-and-a-half miles. That's 14,170 feet of sugary goodness, to be exact! That's longer than the Hollywood Walk of Fame!

Here in Copley, our Girl Scouts are working hard to earn gold stars of their own. In the past three years, the Copley Fairlawn Girl Scout Service Unit is proud to have 7 girls earn their Girl Scout Gold Award. This award is the highest achievement in Girl Scouting.

Of course, the Girl Scouts don't stop at just cookies. Local troops dedicated countless hours of community service to the Girl Scout National Volunteer Project by cleaning up trails and donating to food banks and shelters. In addition, the Girl Scouts collected, cleaned, and sorted over 800 pounds of plastic which was eventually recycled and transformed into 8-foot benches. You can find these benches at Fort Island Elementary and St. Hilary School, ready to be enjoyed.



The Copley American Legion

The Copley American Legion, Frank Bender Post 473 was chartered by the National Legion Dec 12, 1933, and the Department (State of Ohio) Dec 22, 1933. Named for Copley resident, Benjamin Frank Bender. Frank was orphaned and raised by the Miksch family in Copley. He died of pneumonia and was buried in France during WW I. While organizing the creation of the Post, close friend and founding member of Post 473, Cecil Hopkins, suggested naming the Post after Frank.

The Copley American Legion Auxiliary Unit 473 was chartered by the National Auxiliary on April 30, 1937, and the Department (State of Ohio) on May 10, 1937. There were 24 original members, and now several second and third-generation active members. The American Legion's goals, mission, and activities are supported in a variety of ways through local charities by contributing time, spirit and money to support our veterans and community organizations.

Unit 473 organizes post dinners, get-togethers, and especially Memorial Day ceremonies and parades. Copley High School along with members of the Legion, administer the Americanism & Government testing. Students who place well in the statewide testing, may be awarded a trip to Washington DC, highlighting many Memorials, placing a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown, Gettysburg, and the 911 Memorial in Pennsylvania.

Family of Legion members are eligible for Auxiliary membership. Monthly meetings are on the first Wednesday at 10:30 am at the Post, 3255 Copley Road. Our motto is..."Service--not-self".

The Legion has a continuous record of community service to their members and local veterans since their charter was issued, organizing the annual time-honored commemorative

Memorial Day Parades and Ceremonies. In 2022, the Copley American Legion, Frank Bender Post 473 will hold the 90th consecutive ceremony.

Since the early 60s, the Legion has raised the flag at all Copley home football games. Most members are also active in a variety of Legion-related groups, local church and community organizations.

All who have worn the uniform, and were honorably discharged, are eligible and are included in the membership. The meetings are on the second Tuesday, 7:00 pm at the Post 3255 Copley Road.

Community Emergency Response Team C.E.R.T.

CERT is a training program that prepares you to help yourself, your family and your neighbors in the event of a disaster. By getting trained in CERT, you will have the skills to help emergency responders save lives and protect property.

Under the direction of local emergency responders, CERT teams help provide critical support by giving immediate assistance to victims, providing damage assessment information, and helping organize other volunteers at a disaster site.

In addition to supporting emergency responders during a disaster, the CERT program builds strong working relationships between emergency responders and the people they serve.

CERT training takes 16 hours to complete and provides critical skills in emergency preparedness and response.

Copley Historical Society

The Copley Historical Society was formed in 1974 by area residents when it was discovered that the old AC&Y rail depot was to be destroyed. The saving, moving, and restoration of the Depot was the work of the Society.

Other projects include a Pioneer Memorial Marker located in Copley Cemetery, identification of century homes, taped interviews with older residents entitled, Copley Historical Society Memories Program, cataloging of newspaper clippings dating from the mid 1800's onward, return of the Copley Cannon (which was stolen twice), securing and restoring a 1947 railroad caboose and acquiring historic artifacts and objects.
