Nuisance Properties

As we continue to focus on our community, it would be prudent to point out issues that would help to keep things running smoothly in the neighborhoods. More often than not, neighbors get along amazingly well. However, from time-to-time there are issues that arise that eventually come to the Township's various departments for a resolution.

Below is a list that highlights the calls received at the township and the tools given by federal, state and county laws to assist in these issues.

Nuisance Properties - Probably the most calls received during late spring, all summer and early fall are nuisance property complaints, noxious weeds, vegetation, debris and garbage. Ohio Revised Code Section 505.87 addresses these issues and grants township trustees authority to order the noxious weeds, vegetation, debris and garbage abated and the cost of abatement is placed as a lien on the property.

High Grass - Second place are calls for uncut lawns. Summit County's Codified Ordinances Chapter 521 Health Safety and Sanitation, Section 521.10 Noxious Weeds and Rank Vegetation cites grass over eight inches high on **improved lots**. Once per year, The Clerk of County Council shall publish in one (1) newspaper of general circulation during the first day of May each year notice of the County's determination that noxious weeds and rank vegetation are public nuisances. "The notice shall further demand that all owners of property in any township remove all noxious weeds and regularly cut rank vegetation to a height of less than eight inches on improved property and within the right-of-way portion of any non-improved property." The cost of abatement is placed as a lien on the property and considered a third degree misdemeanor.

Placement of Trash Cans - Complaints of trash cans set out days before pickup or never taken in come into the township. Trash cans set out for periods of time attract all sorts of animals and we find that the trash company is not going to clean it up when the garbage is scattered about.

This is an issue that most people do not know they are violating any laws. The rule of thumb for trash pickup is to place the cans out the night before and take in by the evening of pickup. Summit County's Codified Ordinances Chapter 521 Health, Safety and Sanitation, Section 521.08 Littering and Deposit of Garbage, Rubbish, Junk, Etc. addresses this in Section 521.08 (c) No person shall cause or allow litter to be collected or **remain in any place** to the damage or prejudice of others or of the public, or unlawfully obstruct, impede, divert, corrupt or render unwholesome or impure, any natural watercourse. This is considered a fourth degree misdemeanor.

Yard Waste Disposal - Federal and state law cover this one. Storm Water Management Best Management Practices (BMPs) evolved out of the Clean Water Act of 1972. The water's edge should be free and clear of any yard waste and debris. Lawn clippings should be bagged and placed out for trash pickup or composted. NEVER should they be dumped on any green space or vacant lots in a subdivision or **anywhere** in the township. EPA fines are stiff.

Tornado Facts

Quick facts you should know about tornadoes:

- They may strike quickly, with little or no warning.
- They may appear nearly transparent until dust and debris are picked up or a cloud forms in the funnel.
- The average tornado moves Southwest to Northeast, but tornadoes have been known to move in any direction.
- The average forward speed of a tornado is 30 mph, but may vary from stationary to 70 mph.
- Waterspouts are tornadoes that form over water.
- Tornadoes are most frequently reported east of the Rocky Mountains during spring and summer months.
- Peak tornado season in the southern states is March through May; in the northern states, it is late spring through early summer.
- Tornadoes are most likely to occur between 3pm and 9pm, but can occur at any time.



Know the Terms

Familiarize yourself with these terms to help identify a tornado hazard:

Tornado Watch - Tornadoes are possible. Remain alert for approaching storms. Watch the sky and stay tuned to NOAA Weather Radio, commercial radio and television for information.

Tornado Warning - A tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. Take shelter immediately.

Lawn Mower Safety

Lawn mowers are helpful tools, but can be very dangerous if not used properly. Each year thousands of people suffer deep cuts, loss of fingers and toes, and broken bones due to improper or careless use of lawn mowers. Injuries can be avoided by following proper safety precautions.

- Keep lawn mower in good working condition. Have it serviced annually to ensure proper working condition.
- Be sure the motor is off prior to inspecting or repairing the lawn mower.
- Use a stick or broom (not hands or feet) to remove debris from lawn mower.
- Do not remove safety devices such as shields or guards.
- Add fuel before starting the engine.
- Do not walk away from a running lawn mower. Shut the engine off if you must walk away.
- Wear protective gloves, goggles, sturdy shoes and long pants. Never sandals or flip flops.
- Teach children to stay away from all running mowers.
- Never allow a child to ride on a mower, even with parents.
- Children should be at least 12 years of age before operating a push mower and 16 to operate a riding mower.
- Use caution when mowing hills or slopes.

Preserving and Improving the Tree Canopy

As the spring season approaches, warm weather invites us to come outdoors and begin another season of enhancing and beautifying our properties. A common activity during this time of the season involves the planting of new trees. In fact, Arbor Day is celebrated this year on April 24, the perfect time to plant a tree. Planting trees is strongly encouraged as it provides numerous benefits including but not limited to:

- Cleans the Air We Breathe
- Conserves Energy by Providing Shade
- Prevents Soil Erosion
- Flood/Storm Water Control
- Increased Property Value
- Sense of Place

The Township has been intentional in working towards preserving and improving the tree canopy. Such improvements include tree preservation and landscaping requirements for new development projects. Such changes have led to 1,063 new trees being planted along with nearly twenty-five (25) acres of woodlands being preserved. While this is progress, equipping residents with further knowledge of tree care will compliment these efforts and provide a beautiful canopy and natural areas for generations to come.

While many have become well aware of the emerald ash bore (EAB) and the devastation it has caused to millions of ash trees, this spring season offers an opportunity to evaluate your trees. Ash trees infested with EAB that may have declined or died since last season, could pose a risk to people and property, and may need to be removed. In addition to ash trees, your oak trees warrant an inspection this growing season. Specifically, oak wilt is a serious and often deadly threat to oak trees. Oak wilt is a fungal

disease which grows within the water tissues of oak trees and plugs the vessels which leads to wilting and/or death of the tree. While this area has several species of oaks, the red-black oak group (black, pin, northern red, and scarlet oak, among others) have a high risk of infection. The white oak family (bur, swamp, white, and chinquapin) are more tolerant and disease resistant.

According to Joe Gregory (Certified Arborist with

The Davey Tree Expert Company), a Copley resident, and Chair of the Copley Architectural Review Board (ARB), "Oak wilt has been confirmed in communities nearby, including Fairlawn, and

Copley residents should be aware of the signs and symptoms of oak wilt so they can monitor their oak trees this growing season. If oak wilt is suspected, contact a professional arborist to confirm it and discuss management options. One key aspect of oak wilt management that residents need to know is that they should avoid pruning oaks, especially red oaks, from April 1 through July 15. "Picnic" beetles are thought to be attracted to fresh pruning cuts where they can transmit the fungus and cause new infestations.

North Jacoby Road Area Residents Water/Sewer Rates

The township receives calls from North Jacoby Road area residents who have Akron water but do not yet have water meters installed. Questions on how water usage is billed were answered recently in an email inquiry to the City of Akron who supplies water to Copley.

"The customers that do not have meters are charged a flat fee that assumes 7 units of water. For example, the flat fee for Loch Raven is 7 times the water rate applicable to the area plus 7 times the sewer rate plus billing charges. Copley Square includes a few small condominium units whose flat fee is based on 5 units of water. The bill for Lock Raven also reflects the number of condo units in each building. For example, if there are eight units in each condo building,

we multiply the figures below by 8 for the total bill for each building."

For customers with meters: "We calculate our customers' bills by multiplying their actual or estimated water usage by a water rate, a sewer rate and adding in billing charges. The intent of our bill print format is to show our customers how we spend the money we are billing them. The amount shown for EPA mandates is 15% of the water bill and 83% of the sewer bill. We have different rates for customers outside the City, but all are allocated by the same percentages between EPA mandates, capital improvements and operations."
