We are thankful for...

Since this is the November issue, it is fitting to talk about Thanksgiving. According to accounts, the historic event didn't happen on the fourth Thursday in November as it does today. And, it wasn't even known as Thanksgiving then. Instead, it was considered a harvest celebration and was held whenever the harvest was in and the pilgrims were ready to gather and enjoy the fruits of their labor; which could fall between September until mid-November depending on the weather.

"Thanksgiving has been celebrated nationally on and off since 1789, with a proclamation by George Washington after a request by Congress. Thomas Jefferson chose not to observe the holiday, and its celebration was intermittent until the presidency of Abraham Lincoln, when Thanksgiving became a federal holiday in 1863, during the American Civil War. Lincoln proclaimed a national day of "Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens," to be celebrated on the last Thursday in November. Under President Franklin D. Roosevelt, the date was changed between 1939 and 1941 amid significant controversy. From 1942 onwards, Thanksgiving has been proclaimed by Congress as being on the fourth Thursday in November."

So, what do we know about Thanksgiving in Copley? We do know that more than likely, they did have turkey, albeit wild turkey. According to Samuel Lane's, *Fifty Years and Over in Akron and Summit County*, there were circular hunts in the swamps of Copley. In 1821, two years after Copley was founded, 200 persons participated in a hunt in which they made a circle outside of a swamp and marched toward the center. The result was 75 deer, 18 wild turkeys, 4 bears, 2 wolves and a variety of smaller game. After the swamps were cleared, the hunts became a sporting event. But this time they were getting rid of pests; publishing their results in the newspapers.

Looking back into the 1800's, picture families and friends gathered together dining on venison and turkey, potatoes and greens, homemade breads, and apple pie and being thankful for their homes and the ability to feed their families. What more could you ask for?

Walk and Talk

Copley Township hosted a community Walk and Talk Event on September 14th along Pigeon Creek in the Little Farms Neighborhood. The Walk and Talk is a first in a series of trail & greenway visioning events championed by the Board of Trustees, sponsored by the Department of Community & Economic Development and supported by local Neighborhood Ambassadors. The inaugural event unveiled 0.5 miles of Township owned property which was opened up to the public for the first time in an effort to showcase the many unique qualities of the Little Farms area and the potential that exists for trail development along a former railroad bed owned by the Township.

The event was made possible by volunteers, including Neighborhood Ambassadors, who worked tirelessly to clear and prepare the trail. Community sponsors, including Environmental Design Group (EDG), The University of Akron, Summit Metro Parks, Akron Metropolitan Area Transportation and the Summit County Soil and Water along with the Department of Public Health, made the day possible by lending their professional expertise.

In total, more than 70 individuals enjoyed a day in the sunshine and gained first hand insight into the potential for trails & greenways available in Copley Township.

Change in Septic System Requirements

Summit County Public Health (SCPH) continues to implement the statewide sewage rules that went into effect on January 1, 2015. These rules will impact most of the approximately 31,000 homes in Summit County with septic systems.

The 2015 rules require every home with septic systems to have an operations permit. One requirement of the operation permit is that every septic system has routine maintenance to help ensure the best system function.




Share A Christmas

Copley Township will be accepting donations for its annual "Share A Christmas Program" which benefits needy families in the Copley area by providing toys and gifts for children at Christmas time.

Donations of cash and new, unwrapped toys will be accepted through December 16th at Copley Town Hall, 1540 S. Cleveland-Massillon Road, during normal business hours. After hours donations will be accepted at Copley Fire Department, which is located at the same address. Checks or money orders, made payable to Copley Township, may also be mailed to the above address.

Application forms are available at www.copley.oh.us and in the lobby of the Town Hall and police department. These programs are for families residing in Copley



and/or the Copley-Fairlawn school district only. Proof of residency is required.

The township works closely with the Copley-Fairlawn Kiwanis Club and the Copley Outreach Center on this project. In addition to toys and gift items, eligible families receive food baskets, hats, gloves and coats. Non-perishable food items and new or gently used coats may also be delivered to the Town Hall.

Heritage Days Award Winning Bake-Off Recipes

There were so many amazing entries at the Copley Heritage Days Bake-Off this year! Although it has been a few years since we have seen this event, bakers outdid themselves in each of the four categories:

- 1.) Cakes (including cupcakes, sheet cakes and layer cakes)
- 2.) Cookies (including bars, drop and cutouts)
- 3.) Quick breads (including muffins, coffee cakes and pan breads.)
- 4.) Pastries (including pies, tarts and strudels)

In this issue of the Copley Connection, we would like to share not only the 1st place winner of the pastry category, but the person who also won Best in Show - Pam Doubell!

Pam baked a pie called Mystery Pecan Pie and this is her recipe:

8 oz. cream cheese
1/3 cup plus 1/4 cup sugar
4 eggs
1 cup light corn syrup
2 tsp vanilla
1/4 tsp salt
1 1/4 cups chopped pecans

Beat cream cheese, 1/3 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 tsp vanilla and salt in small mixing bowl until thick and creamy. Set aside. In another bowl beat 3 eggs until well blended. Add 1/4 cup sugar, corn syrup and 1 tsp vanilla. Blend well.

Use one 9" unbaked pie crust. Spread cream cheese mixture in the bottom of crust. Sprinkle with pecans, then gently pour corn syrup on top. Bake at 375 for 35-40 minutes, until center is firm to touch
