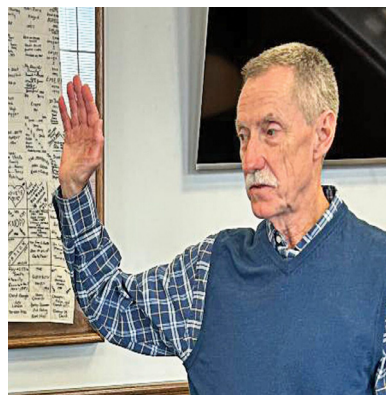

JOINT POLICE AND FIRE SAFETY CENTER

In November 2022, the residents of Copley Township voted to fund one of the most meaningful investments of our generation – a new joint Police and Fire Safety Facility. Finally, after years of planning, designing, creating and promoting, a new state-of-the-art facility provides a safer, more efficient environment in which our firefighters, EMS and police personnel can work to protect our community.

The Police Department occupies the north end of the facility moving from a small manufacturing facility converted to a Police Station in the 90's into a building designed with safety in mind and able to accommodate the 27 full-time and 6 part-time officers currently in place. Accommodations for safe, on-site storage of records, evidence and weapons have been included as well.

The Fire Department occupies the southern portion of the building providing 12 vehicle bays, adequate training space, on-site storage of supplies and equipment and a safe decontamination area.

The middle section of the building is a common area for both departments to hold multi-jurisdictional training seminars. In addition, a "Safe Room" will be available to the community 24/7 and a "Baby Box" has been installed meeting the community's safety needs in very particular ways.

Ground was broken on September 23, 2023 and our Safety Forces have been operating from the new facility since April 2025.

In addition, the project has included an access road connecting Cleveland Massillon Road and Copley Road that will rejuvenate Copley Circle, reduce traffic issues and expand our pedestrian network. The extended infrastructure includes landscaping and a sidewalk that will eventually connect with a new sidewalk on Cleveland Massillon from the new intersection at Sunset Drive south to Copley Circle.

COMMUNITY HALL

The final phase of the entire project includes the renovation of the existing fire bays into a Township Community Room. Work has already begun to ensure that our residents have a place to gather that reflects the support from the community at large and provides a comfortable, innovative environment for community groups and individual residents alike. The room will hold about 200 with chairs only or about 75 with tables and chairs and will include AV Equipment and a small kitchen/serving area.

The Service Department will continue to use a portion of the bays for storage of their vehicles – vehicles which are currently stored outside. The entrance to the Community Room on the south side of the building will open out to a patio extending the space to accommodate the outside on those beautiful Ohio summer and fall days! Completion date is anticipated to be this fall, 2025.

To date, all costs of construction – including change orders and use of contingency dollars – have been within budget. At the time the bonds were sold to finance the project, a premium was recognized; combining the premium with interest earned on the bond proceeds throughout the construction period, the project has remained within budget and the Trustees anticipate that some of those funds may be returned reducing the overall debt of the project. Plans are underway for a Community Open House for the Safety Center scheduled for June 22, 2-4 PM.

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FIRE

Established as a volunteer fire department in 1937, the Copley Township Fire Department is a well-equipped, professionally staffed, full-time operation. The department is made up of a combination of full and part-time personnel working around the clock to provide Fire, Rescue, EMS, and Prevention services to Copley Township and surrounding communities.

A NEED FOR A NEW HOME

For decades, the Copley Fire Department operated out of a space that was never intended to serve a modern fire service. Housed in the repurposed basement of a former schoolhouse attached to Town Hall, the department made the most of its limited space. Over the years, as the number of personnel and emergency apparatus increased, the facility was remodeled and expanded to the extent the building would allow. Despite the dedication and creativity of the department's leadership, the building simply could not keep up with the evolving needs of a professional fire service.

Challenges mounted as the facility aged: moisture and inadequate ventilation led to persistent mold problems, and the structure could not accommodate the hot, warm, and cold zone separations that are critical to reducing firefighters' exposure to carcinogens. Most significantly, there was no remaining space to support the department's continued growth—growth that is essential to meet the rising demand for emergency services in Copley Township. It became clear that a new, purpose-built facility was not just a wish, but a necessity for the safety, health, and effectiveness of our first responders.

Recognizing the urgent need for both the police and fire departments to operate from facilities designed specifically for their missions, the Copley community came together in support of a long-term solution. In November 2022, residents approved a bond levy to fund the construction of a new, purpose-built safety facility. The project was a major undertaking—years in the making. In a recent conversation with our Fire Chief, Chris Bower, regarding the new safety center he stated "Our goal was to provide the best facility we could within budget. I think we hit the mark. Our new facility provides state-of-the-art design and equipment that will serve the community far into the future."

The new safety center features advanced equipment and design elements that not only meet today's operational needs, but will also support the department's growth for decades to come. It includes dedicated training spaces, individual dorm rooms to ensure firefighters get the rest they need during long shifts, and clearly defined decontamination zones to help reduce exposure to hazardous



substances, including carcinogens. Most importantly, it gives our personnel the necessary room to grow.

Our team is excited and deeply appreciative to work in a space that was thoughtfully designed with their health, safety, and effectiveness in mind. This facility stands as a testament to the community's commitment to public safety and the future of Copley Township.

CABINET FINDS IT'S WAY BACK

Just before moving into the new fire station, the department received a special addition: a vintage secretary cabinet discovered by former Copley firefighter Brian Abbott. He spotted the piece listed for donation on Facebook Marketplace and quickly shared it with the team. The cabinet was located in a storage unit in North Akron, and while its history remains a mystery, it was carefully repaired and restored. We feel incredibly fortunate to have found this unique piece just in time—it adds a touch of character and tradition to our new h

■ POLICE

Copley Township covers about 20 square miles and has over 18,000 residents living in about 7,000 housing units. Copley Township is the tenth largest community in Summit County, the largest township, and is larger than all of the villages.

The Copley Police Department operated out of a small building at 1280 Sunset Drive for about 30 years. This building, which had formerly been a small brush manufacturing facility, was remodeled to serve as the Police Department offices. At that time, there were probably about 15 full-time police officers on the Copley staff. The building served the department well, but due to growth in the department, it became necessary to increase the size of our facility.

Under the direction of Chief Michael Mier, the Copley Police Department has grown to 26 full-time and six part-time officers. Most of the officers are assigned to street patrol duties. There are four detectives and three School Resource Officers. Copley Police officers patrol the community in marked police cruisers, unmarked vehicles, bicycles, a motorcycle, and on foot in many areas. The department has one Police Dog, "Chip", who works with his partner daily. Chip is cross-trained to search for suspects, search for property, trained in narcotics detection, and to protect his partner.



The Copley Police Department participates in several multi-jurisdictional task forces to better serve the community and save money. We have detectives assigned to the Summit County Drug Unit and the Ohio Organized Crime Commission

SNIT Narcotics Unit. We also participate in the Metro SWAT Team, the Metro Crash Team, and the United States Marshal's Violent Fugitive Task Force.

Enhancing Community Safety and Service

The Copley Township Police Department has officially moved into its new home within the recently completed Safety Center.

One of the standout features of the new lobby is the addition of a secure "safe room." This room is available for anyone who feels they are in immediate danger or is being followed. Upon entering the lobby, individuals can access this secure space, where they remain protected until an

officer arrives to assist them.

Beyond the lobby, the building includes a large multipurpose meeting room used for officer training, and meetings—strengthening the department's capacity for professional development.

The new facility also resolves long-standing space limitations. Officers now have adequate and secure areas for storing evidence, conducting inventories, and performing preliminary tests on suspected drugs. This expansion ensures proper handling and chain of custody procedures are upheld to meet legal standards.

In addition, the department can now safely store a wide range of recovered property—ranging from personal items to vehicles—until rightful owners are identified. This secure storage capability is essential, especially when property must be held for extended periods.

In compliance with updated state laws, the building includes modern interview rooms equipped with audio and visual recording systems. Detectives and juvenile officers also benefit from increased office space, allowing them to conduct investigations, interviews, and youth diversion hearings in a professional and private setting.

Thanks to the community's unwavering support, Copley Township has established a police facility that meets modern standards and supports best practices

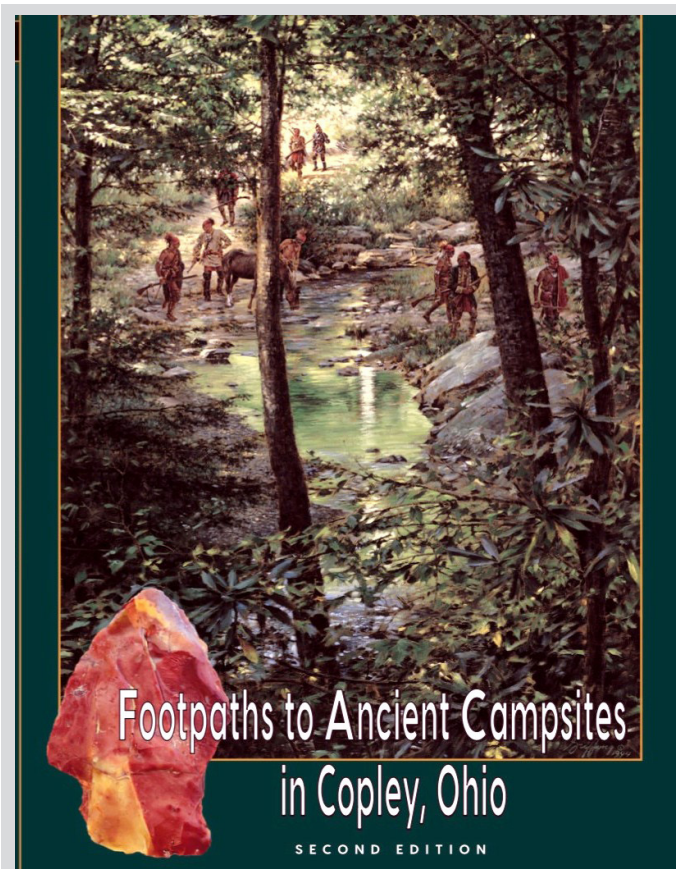
in public safety. This investment not only enhances the capabilities of our police department but also reinforces our shared commitment to making Copley a safer and stronger place to call home.

Since joining us in 2021, he has been instrumental in enhancing the infrastructure of our Township. Mr. Tracy has 10+ years of experience in public service and earned a Bachelor of Science Degree from The Ohio State University.

Shawna Gfroerer, MPA, Zoning Inspector. Ms. Gfroerer serves as the Zoning Inspector supporting the overall operations of the zoning & permitting process for the Township. Jeff Newman, Code Enforcement Officer. Mr. Jeff Newman serves as the Township's Code Enforcement Officer (CEO) and is responsible for the implementation and enforcement of the Property Maintenance Code. Mr. Newman reviews concerns and complaints by performing on-site investigations. Mr. Newman is tasked with ensuring structures are structurally safe and properties are free from nuisance and blight affects.

Clarissa Hunt, Administrative Assistant. As the Administrative Assistant for the Department of Community & Economic Development, Ms. Hunt assists the Director, the Zoning Inspector and the Code Enforcement Officer as well as serves as a liaison for the various events, activities, programs and business celebrations.



COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT CORPORATION (CIC)

The Community Improvement Corporation (CIC) is designed to advance, encourage, and promote the industrial, economic, commercial, and civic development of Copley Township. The CIC functions as a not-for-profit and has all the powers granted a corporation not-for-profit under Chapter 1702 and 1724 of the Ohio Revised Code. The Copley Township Board of Trustees have officially designated the CIC as the Township's agency for economic development per Chapter 1724 of the Ohio Revised Code. Guided by a 10-person Board of Directors, the CIC is focused on revitalizing undeveloped or underutilized land throughout the community and supporting local businesses through its Annual Matching Grant Program. COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The department's focus lies within several core objectives which include economic development, community engagement, neighborhood revitalization, and strategic land planning. Copley strives to foster sound economic development objectives which facilitate investment, through the Community Improvement Corporation, a strategic Business Expansion Retention Plan, and well-placed Infrastructure. We emphatically believe engaging with our residents will foster greater community pride and collective unity. Part of that engagement includes engaging with homeowners to improve and enhance the housing stock and thereby help foster strong and prosperous neighborhoods. Residents are encouraged to utilize the Property Maintenance Code and Keep Copley Beautiful initiatives to help protect and restore our neighborhoods. We must also do our part to plan for future generations. A great deal of attention has been given to strategic planning initiatives as this becomes the foundation for an equitable community. Zoning Permits and Resolutions are instrumental in sound land planning. Additionally, Copley supports a Comprehensive Land Use Plan which guides the Township on strategic land-use decisions.

JEDD SEWER EXTENSION

In an effort to ensure that parcels along Copley's main thoroughfare (SR162) are adequately serviced with the necessary public utilities to drive economic development in the township, the township has planned and started a \$7M sewer improvement project. The township has partnered with the Summit County Department of Sanitary Sewer Services to manage the installation of sanitary sewer on Copley Rd from SR21 east to the

intersection with Jacoby Rd. Phase 1 of the installation, which serves the new Safety Center on Sunset Dr, runs from Sunset Dr to Centerview Circle has been completed. Phase II is currently under design and scheduled to start construction in the summer or fall of 2026.

RIDGEWOOD ROAD TRAIL

The Ridgewood Rd Trail is a new multi-modal trail that will link residents to schools and amenities in the township. This fall, residents living in the northwest quadrant of the Township will have a new way to get to the High School using the new eight-foot wide, one-mile long trail on Ridgewood Road.

The trail begins at S. Hametown Rd and extends the entire length of Ridgewood Rd to Cleveland Massillon Road. The trail is being funded almost entirely with grants funds received from the American Rescue Plan Act and State Capital Improvement Program. The construction of this trail is the start of integrating a pedestrian network within the township as part of the Township's multi modal connectivity plan.



MONTROSE MINI PLAN GATHERING

On September 24, 2024, approximately 60 residents and stakeholders gathered with the Copley Township Zoning Commission, staff and consultant, Kimley-Horn to discuss the future of the Montrose Neighborhood. The Kimley-Horn team presented information gathered about the neighborhood including land use, zoning, circulation, parking, mobility features and visual analysis of the existing buildings and landscape. Residents participated in three exercises including: Assets & Issues Identification, Placemaking, and Circulation, Parking, Mobility & Zoning. In general participants expressed a desire to make the area pedestrian friendly with more opportunities to gather and walk in the Montrose shopping areas



ADAPTIVE REUSES BRING NEW LIFE TO MONTROSE

The Department of Community & Economic Development has been busy working with property owners and land developers to bring new life to existing buildings in Montrose. Beginning in 2022, Butterfli Holdings approached Copley with the vision of retrofitting a former single tenant building, known formerly as Ethan Allen, into a multi-tenant building. The vision brought a new approach to the area and up to four new businesses to the area. To date, Panera, X Golf and most recently, Honeygrow, are now occupying this refreshed space.

In 2024, Akron Children's Hospital reached out with a goal of moving pediatric services to Copley. The result was a complete update to the former Golf Galaxy space creating the new Akron Children's Urgent Care.

MONTROSE LIGHTING IMPROVEMENTS

Copley Township believes that property maintenance and upkeep is a priority. The department has been actively working with property owners in the Montrose Areas to update the Market Square in Montrose plaza lighting as well as street lighting along Flight Memorial Drive. Lighting is essential to a safe, welcoming environment and brings customers and new tenants alike. SERVICE

The Service Department is tasked with maintaining all Township owned buildings and their properties along with all dedicated Township road right-of-ways. With a crew of nine full-time professionals possessing a variety of skills, the Service Department cares for our 80-acre Community Park, Copley Circle and three cemeteries while maintaining all Township buildings - Copley Town Hall, Copley Community Hall, Old Fire Station #2, Service Department garages, the Safety Center, the Community Park maintenance building, equipment storage facilities, the salt storage building, the Historical Depot, and ACY Caboose. In addition, the Township preserves 61.715 miles of Township roads ensuring safe and secure passage in any and all types of weather conditions.

Frost Solutions

After a successful pilot program during the winter of 23-24 the township added two additional mini weather stations to monitor weather and road conditions for the 24-25 winter season. The three mini weather stations have proved effective allowing management and staff to monitor road conditions remotely and assist in predicting the need for a snow and ice response. The addition of the monitors has allowed the Service Department to be proactive in responding to weather events. In many cases the Service Department is able to react and plan in advance of weather events reducing the need for safety forces to contact dispatch when road conditions have already deteriorated.

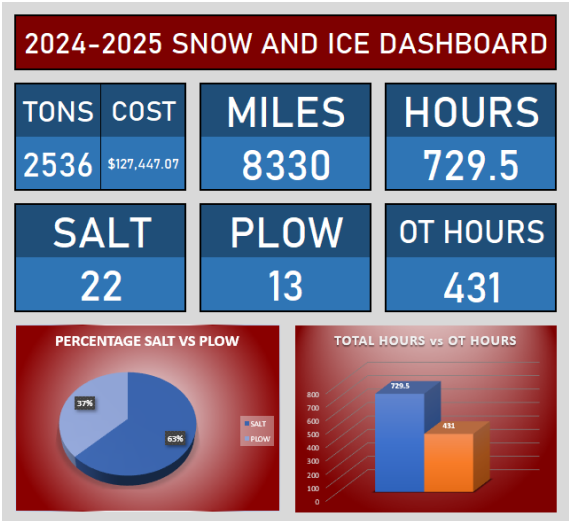


Mini Weather Station located in Copley Township, at the corner of Heritage Woods and SR-18.

Safety Grants

The Township installed tarps on two separate dump trucks utilizing the Ohio Bureau of Workers Compensation Safety Intervention Grant. The total cost of the tarps was \$5,970.00 with the township being responsible for 25% of that cost which equates to \$1492.50. The tarps

Equipment

As part of Copley Township’s ongoing Capital Equipment Replacement Plan, the Service Department recently welcomed two major equipment upgrades aimed at improving operational efficiency and reducing downtime.

A brand-new 2024 Freightliner dump truck, equipped with a snow and ice control package, has been added to the fleet. This modern vehicle replaces a 2002 International model, which was sold at auction to help offset the cost of the new equipment. In addition, the department acquired a 2024 CAT 420 backhoe to replace a 1992 Ford 655C model.

These strategic replacements reflect Copley Township’s commitment to maintaining a well-equipped, high-performing service department. One that continues to meet the needs of our growing community with dependable, up-to-date resources.

THE WILLIAMS FAMILY

Recently, resident Wendy Williams visited the township offices to request assistance with a unique challenge. Wendy and her husband David, who live on Heritage Woods Drive, regularly walk through their neighborhood picking up litter left by others. During one of their routine cleanups, they came across a significant amount of illegal dumping—specifically, 22 discarded tires.

While the couple is accustomed to collecting and disposing of several bags of trash each week, the tires posed a more complicated problem. Wendy initially wasn't sure where to turn. She first stopped at the Copley Police Department, where she was quickly connected with township staff for further help.

Inspired by the couple's civic-minded spirit, the township determined it would support their efforts directly. Staff arranged to meet them at their home to help transport the tires.



By the time township staff arrived at the Williams' residence later that day, the couple had already pulled 20 of the 22 tires from the overgrown, muddy embankment and stacked them neatly near the curb.

Wendy and her husband expressed heartfelt appreciation for the township's assistance, and Copley Township, in turn, extends sincere thanks to the Williams family for their dedication to keeping the community clean and beautiful. Their efforts are a powerful reminder of the pride our residents take in their community and a shining example of what it means to care for the place you call home.

NEWLY TRAINED DRUG RECOGNITION EXPERTS

The Ohio Drug Recognition Expert Program is a traffic safety program that focuses on the detection, apprehension, and adjudication of drug-impaired drivers. A Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) is a law enforcement officer who is highly trained to recognize impairment of drivers under the influence of drugs other than or in addition to alcohol.

All Copley Police Officers are trained in the detection of impaired drivers and follow strict guidelines to monitor and test persons suspected of operating vehicles while impaired. The DRE Program, however, provides DRE officers with significantly more skills to not only detect impairment but to identify the type of drug the subject might be under the influence of at the time of arrest.

The DRE training program is very involved and difficult. Officers participate in two weeks of classroom training.

During the third week of training, DRE candidates travel out of state to participate in live training with the hope of successfully completing the program and attaining the certification necessary for court room testimony.

Candidates for the program must complete several threshold steps prior to qualification for the training. Copley Police Officers William Diesch and Michael Greissing both recently participated in the training program. Both traveled to Florida, where they participated in the certification process. Both of these officers successfully completed the program and are now fully certified Drug Recognition Experts.

All of our DRE officers are available to other area department should they have a need for a Drug Recognition Expert. We commend our officers for expressing interest in the DRE Program and taking the time to participate in the difficult training to successfully become a certified Drug Recognition Expert.

Copley Outreach Center

The Copley Community Outreach Center is one of the only local community resource centers located in Copley Township. The Center is a faith based, volunteer driven food assistance center that has been in operation since 1995 under the support of the Copley United Methodist Church and Guardian Angels Catholic Church. In 1995, the two Churches converted a small single family dwelling located on the corner of S. Cleveland-Massillon Road and N. Sunnyfield Drive into an Emergency Food Pantry to meet the growing needs of residents in the Township and within the Copley-Fairlawn School District. Over the last twenty-six years, the Center has grown to provide resources for Utility to help prevent shut-offs, as well as emergency food assistance. These services are offered primarily to seniors and low income families. The Outreach Center has partnered with the Akron-Canton Food Bank to assist in food supply needs at a reduced rate.

In December of 2019, Mrs. Maryann Henry was appointed as the new Director of the Copley Outreach Center. Mrs. Henry has taken steps to continue to support all of the families in our community and our school district. The Center is now able to provide annual assistance to over 30 seniors in the community, 100 families and 165 students in the Copley-Fairlawn School District.

The Copley Community Outreach Center is fortunate to have the support of organizations including; The Copley United Methodist Church, Guardian Angels Church, The Copley Fairlawn School District, Copley Kiwanis, and Angels in Blue Jeans, supported by Guardian Angels.

Gold Star Girl Scouts

If you were to line up every box of cookies sold by the Copley-Fairlawn Girl Scouts in 2021, the stretch of Thin Mints, Samoas, and Tagalongs would span over two-and-a-half miles. That's 14,170 feet of sugary goodness, to be exact! That's longer than the Hollywood Walk of Fame!

Here in Copley, our Girl Scouts are working hard to earn gold stars of their own. In the past three years, the Copley Fairlawn Girl Scout Service Unit is proud to have 7 girls earn their Girl Scout Gold Award. This award is the highest achievement in Girl Scouting.

Of course, the Girl Scouts don't stop at just cookies. Local troops dedicated countless hours of community service to the Girl Scout National Volunteer Project by cleaning up trails and donating to food banks and shelters. In addition, the Girl Scouts collected, cleaned, and sorted over 800 pounds of plastic which was eventually recycled and transformed into 8-foot benches. You can find these benches at Fort Island Elementary and St. Hilary School, ready to be enjoyed.

The Copley American Legion

The Copley American Legion, Frank Bender Post 473 was chartered by the National Legion Dec 12, 1933, and the Department (State of Ohio) Dec 22, 1933. Named for Copley resident, Benjamin Frank Bender. Frank was orphaned and raised by the Miksch family in Copley. He died of pneumonia and was buried in France during WW I. While organizing the creation of the Post, close friend and founding member of Post 473, Cecil Hopkins, suggested naming the Post after Frank.

The Copley American Legion Auxiliary Unit 473 was chartered by the National Auxiliary on April 30, 1937, and the Department (State of Ohio) on May 10, 1937. There were 24 original members, and now several second and third-generation active members. The American Legion's goals, mission, and activities are supported in a variety of ways though local charities by contributing time, spirit and money to support our veterans and community organizations.

Unit 473 organizes post dinners, get-togethers, and especially Memorial Day ceremonies and parades. Copley High School along with members of the Legion, administer the Americanism & Government testing. Students who place well in the statewide testing, may be awarded a trip to Washington DC, highlighting many Memorials, placing a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown, Gettysburg, and the 911 Memorial in Pennsylvania.

Family of Legion members are eligible for Auxiliary membership. Monthly meetings are on the first Wednesday at 10:30 am at the Post, 3255 Copley Road. Our motto is..."Service--not-self".

The Legion has a continuous record of community service to their members and local veterans since their charter was issued, organizing the annual time-honored commemorative

Memorial Day Parades and Ceremonies. In 2025, the Copley American Legion, Frank Bender Post 473 will hold the 93rd consecutive ceremony.

Since the early 60s, the Legion has raised the flag at all Copley home football games. Most members are also active in a variety of Legion-related groups, local church and community organizations.

All who have worn the uniform, and were honorably discharged, are eligible and are included in the membership. The meetings are on the second Tuesday, 7:00 pm at the Post 3255 Copley Road.

Copley Bandstand Summer Music Series

48 years ago a few community members decided to get together and figure out a way to bring live musical entertainment to the citizens of Copley. This was the genesis of The Copley Bandstand Summer Music Series. We provide concerts every summer on Sunday evenings from June to August. We are run by volunteers and funded through donations. 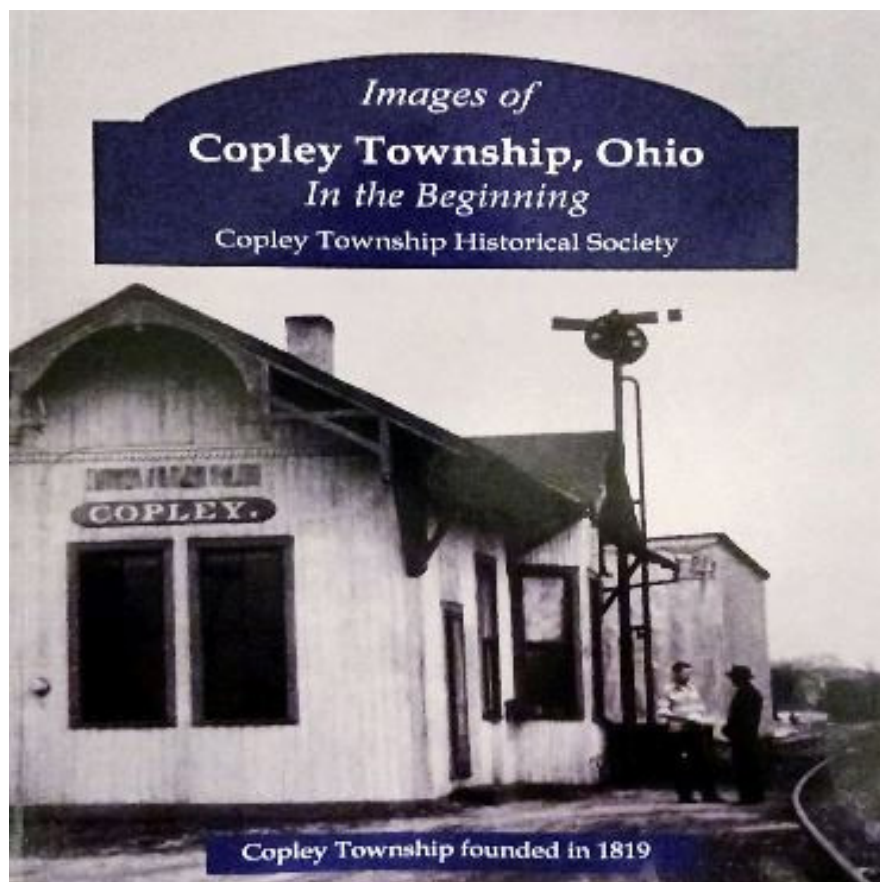
